This work will be collected upon your child's return to school. Assignments are required to be completed.



## **Teddy Roosevelt Teaching Points**

The following are some topics you can review with your student at home:

- Teddy Roosevelt was a president. He was caring, helpful, and hard-working.
- Taking care of plants, animals, and the environment were very important to Roosevelt.
- He showed respect for the environment by protecting animals and their homes. Roosevelt started more than 50 bird refuges. A refuge is a safe home for animals. He also started five national parks while he was president.
- Roosevelt started the Boone and Crockett Club. He did this as a way of helping to protect animals and the land they live on.
- Roosevelt's face is carved into Mount Rushmore.
