You can change your voice to show what the character is feeling and bring the character to life. Can you think of another way to sort the shapes? (Suggestion for parents: Sort by number of sides, number of vertices/corners, or by shape). Explain why you sorted it that way.</p>	<p>Watch the BrainPopJr. video “Plane Shapes”. Plane shapes are also called 2D shapes.</p> <p>Shapes can be all different sizes, colors, and can face in different directions.</p> <p>Today we will learn about the circle and triangle. A circle is a round, flat, 2D shape with no vertices/corners. Practice drawing circles. Can you find any circles in your house? Go on a shape hunt!</p> <p>A triangle is a flat, 2D shape with three sides and three</p>	<p>Rewatch the BrainPopJr. video “Plane Shapes”.</p> <p>Remember that shapes can be all different sizes, colors, and can face in different directions.</p> <p>Today we will learn about the square and rectangle. A square is a flat, 2D shape with four <u>equal</u> sides and four vertices/corners. Practice drawing squares, but make sure all four sides are <u>equal</u>. Can you find any squares in your house? Go on a shape hunt!</p>	<p>Today we will learn about the trapezoid. A trapezoid is a flat, 2D shape with four sides. The trapezoid has two equal sides and two unequal sides.</p>  <p>If you take a triangle and cut the top off, you will have a trapezoid! Try this out. Draw and cut out a triangle. The cut the top off to make a trapezoid. Can you find any</p>	<p>We describe shapes using defining attributes. Defining attributes are characteristics of shapes that differentiate it from other shapes. Defining attributes of 2D shapes are flat, closed, number of sides, and number of vertices.</p> <p>Here are the defining attributes of each shape: Circle – closed shape, flat, no</p>

Teddy Roosevelt Teaching Points

The following are some topics you can review with your student at home:

- Teddy Roosevelt was a president. He was caring, helpful, and hard-working.
- Taking care of plants, animals, and the environment were very important to Roosevelt.
- He showed respect for the environment by protecting animals and their homes. Roosevelt started more than 50 bird refuges. A refuge is a safe home for animals. He also started five national parks while he was president.
- Roosevelt started the Boone and Crockett Club. He did this as a way of helping to protect animals and the land they live on.
- Roosevelt's face is carved into Mount Rushmore.
